



Evaluating **web** sources

You don't always have to use library resources to find credible information on your topic. But when you do find sources online, use your **critical thinking skills** to evaluate them.

1 Purpose & Audience

Think about: What's the point? Why is this site here?
Who was this site/information intended for?

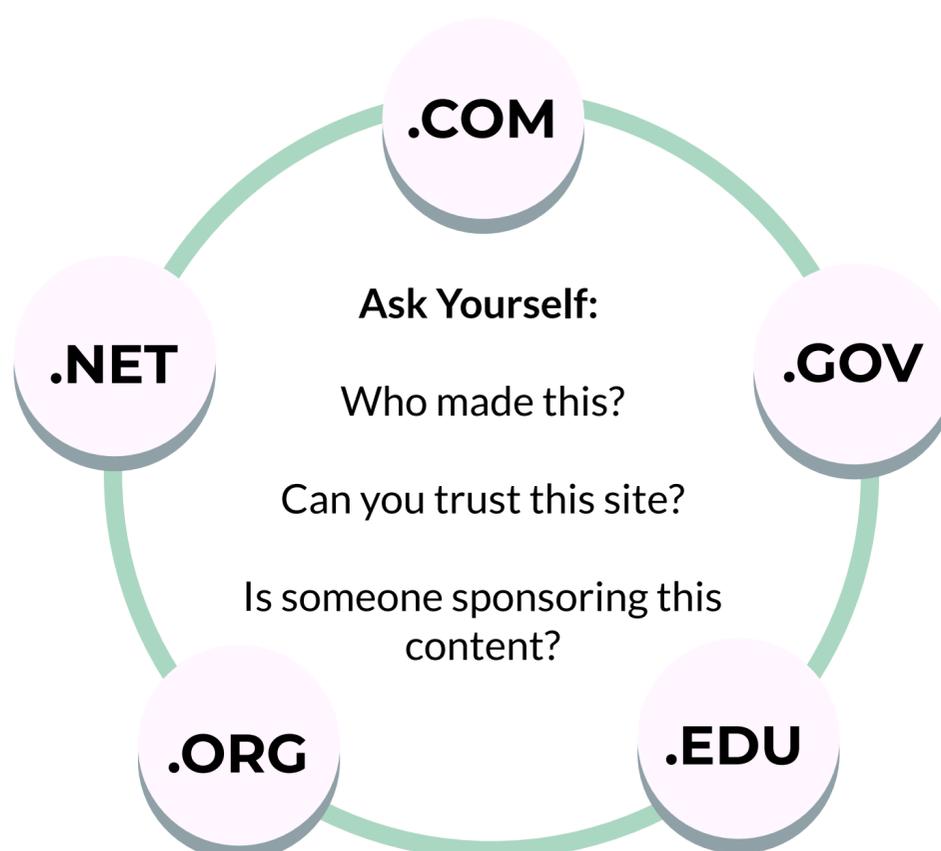
Is this site trying to:



Is it for or against something? Giving facts or opinions? Why? And for who?

2 Context or Source

Think about: What are the facts? Where are they coming from?
Can you verify the information elsewhere? Is it current?



Just because it is a .gov or .edu does not mean it is 100% reliable or accurate information. Look beyond the website name to decide if they are credible.

Think about: How is it packaged? Can you verify the information elsewhere or with another source?
