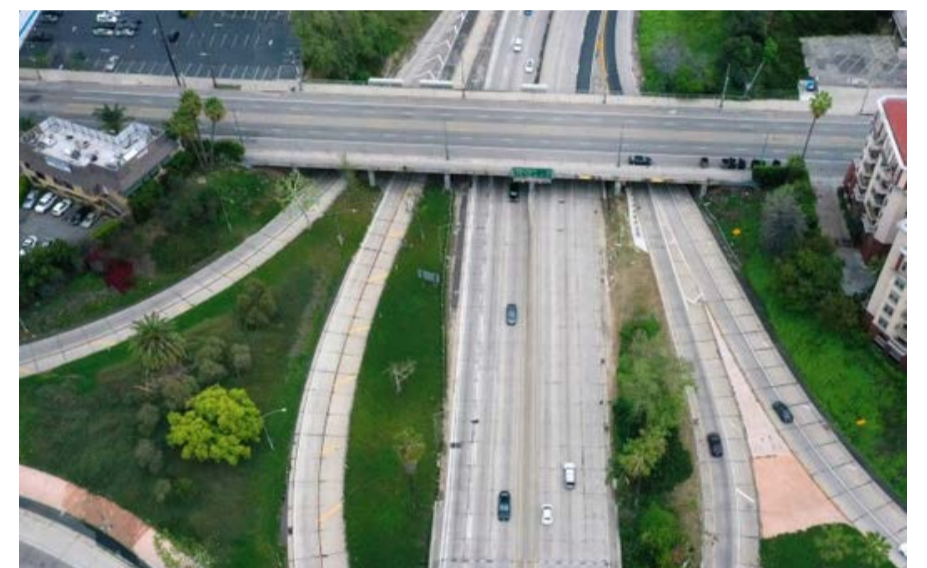

4 **LOS ANGELES** The COVID-19 pandemic reduced global greenhouse gas emissions by a record 7% this year, according to new estimates released Thursday by an international group of scientists.

Headline

These are usually in larger bold text. They are short, catchy, and designed to introduce you to the article and are typically written by the editor instead of the journalist reporting the article.

Subheadline

Some articles will have a smaller sentence after the headline introducing you further to the article.

3

Byline

These are usually in larger bold text. They are short, catchy, and designed to introduce you to the article and are typically written by the editor instead of the journalist reporting the article.

4

Dateline

If a location appears in all caps at the beginning of the sentence, this is the dateline, and where the story was reported from.

5

Caption

Next to each photo, you'll see a short sentence describing it otherwise known as the caption and who took the photo whether it's an organization or an individual.



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
